## From the First Floor

Dear ZIS Community,

A visit to one of our MYP Mathematics classes captured so much of what makes learning at ZIS meaningful, engaging, and relevant. Had you been there for the morning session, you would have observed best educational practice on all levels. Students were respected and respectful, clearly caring for each other and their learning. They were warmly greeted at the door and the quality relationships that have been built were on clear display. Learning objectives for the class were posted and a warm up exercise awaited for students, projected on the board. Students were organized, attentive, and productive during the session. Beyond these "normal" traits of a good learning environment, there was even more to see:

- Students routinely asked insightful questions and saught clarification in order to confirm their understanding. Student agency and student ownership of their learning was strong.
- Collaboration was the norm learning is not an individual competition but a shared experience. Students worked together to test ideas and to encourage success in their efforts.

- An engaging lesson, rich in vocabulary and worked examples, with engaging pacing and grounded in prior knowledge. Sprinkled in was good humor, a willingness to try and fail and try again - a low-risk, high-reward learning space.
- Individualized planning to support differentiation. Every student in the room was being stretched with new skills and content based on their readiness.

Parents don't often have the opportunity to view the classroom in action, but assemblies are wonderful chances to share in student learning and it was great to see so many families in the audience for the Year 4 assembly this Friday. This was another great example of what we value in our classrooms. The students confidently shared a song, actions and all. Groups of students informed and entertained as they presented their research into the World Wildlife Foundation and other environmentally minded organizations. Students shared their theatrical skills at every turn, showing their character and their courage. Teachers announced Learner Profile awards with deserving recipients, certificates in being 'Principled', 'Communicators', and 'Risk-Takers', for example.

Further in the newsletter you will find an invitation to the Toddler Play Group beginning March 25. Thank you to Ms. JoLeen for offering this opportunity to the ZIS Community. I hope you will join in, enjoy the EY facilities and some great company while the children explore, discover, and being their lifelong learning adventure.

Best of luck to the MYP students who depart today to Shenzhen for the Business Simulation competition and to the footballers who travel away on Saturday for their football exchange. Wishing strength and endurance for the intrepid runners too test themselves on campus Saturday morning for the Qi'ao Running League!

We also heard a poem in Polish from Mr. Mike, and one parent came in to read a story in Mandarin Chinese. In addition, we heard about the traditional Māori stories of New Zealand from Mr. Chris!



Finally in the end students had the chance to exercise their creative muscle as they moved towards their final assessment for the unit. 
Books and stories need to be celebrated! Our students are readers, writers and authors who have been enriched by this unit!


We are also fostering open-minded global citizens who can appreciate different cultural and linguistic backgrounds and different ways of viewing the world.
